



BMJ Journals Quick Start Guide



Introduction

BMJ Journals provides full text access to 26 medical journals covering a wide range of specialties. Full text access is from 2000 or earlier for all titles, and is typically from the late 1990s onwards. Access to abstracts goes back as far as 1970 in some cases.

Logging On

Go to <http://www.bmjournals.com/>. You will then see all the available journal titles displayed. To proceed to search or browse the BMJ Journals collection, click on the journal title you are interested in. You will not be asked to login until you attempt to download the full text of an article. When prompted to login, you should follow the **Login via Athens** link and login with your Athens username and password.

Searching the BMJ Journal Collection

To search a particular journal, click on the journal title in the BMJ Journals homepage. If you wish to search more than one title, click on any journal title – you will later have the option to search across multiple titles.

You will see that each title in the collection has its own homepage. The presentation of the homepage varies slightly across the collection, but you should look for an **Advanced Search** link in the **Search** menu at the left hand side of the page:

Specify Journals to Search

High Wire-hosted journals

Journals selected from [list](#) at bottom of page 1

By default only the journal title you have selected will be searched. If you wish to search two or more titles, follow the **search across hundreds of fulltext journals** link beneath the search form. By default you will then search all the journals hosted by High Wire Press, the company that provides the BMJ Journals collection. However, you will only be able to obtain the full text of articles from journals within the BMJ Journals collection free of charge. For other titles you will only be able to view abstracts free of charge. If you are searching across journals, you may find it easier to deal with search results if you select the option to search **Journals selected from list** located below the search boxes (1) to limit your search the titles you specify.

If you are looking for the full text of a reference, use the **specify citation** line of the form (2). If you are looking for articles by a particular author, use the **Author** box (3). If you have the title of an article, use the **Title** box (4). If you are searching for anything on a particular topic, it is best to use the **Text | Abstract | Title** box (5). It is possible to combine different fields in the search form. In the example, the search will look for articles on the topic of pneumothorax by the authors named Greene. To start the search, click on the **Search** button (6).

Viewing Search Results

The results of your search will be presented as a list of citations. If you are searching across multiple journals, for each citation you will see a thumbnail picture of the Journal cover. Beneath this you may see an article price quoted. This means that the article comes from a Journal that is not in the BMJ Journals collection, and so the full text will not be available via your Athens login. To the left is a tick box, which you can use to mark citations to view (abstract only) or for export to reference management software later.

To the right of each citation you will find one or more of these links to further information:

- The [Abstract](#) link will take you to the abstract for the article.
- The [Full Text](#) link will take you an HTML (web page) document containing the full article.
- The [PDF](#) link will take you to the article as a PDF file, presented as the article appeared in the original print issue. The PDF file is the most suitable for printing, particularly if the document contains images. Please note that PDF files are much larger than HTML files; if you are using a dialup Internet connection, a PDF file may take several minutes to download. Browsing the BMJ Journals Collection

After logging in, select the title you wish to browse. If you are already deep within the BMJ Journals site, enter <http://www.bmjournals.com/> in the address box of your browser to go to the front page of the collection and then select the title.

Browsing by issue

Each title in the collection has its own homepage. The presentation of the homepage varies slightly across the collection, but you should look for a **Browse by issue** link in the **Search** menu at the left hand side of the page.

You will then see direct links to recent issues; otherwise you will need to select a year and then an issue. For each issue a summary is shown at the top of the page, below are links to each article in that issue.

Browsing by topic

From the journal's homepage, follow the **Browse by topic** link in the Search menu at the left hand side of the page. You will then see the full list of topics used for BMJ journals. The links in this list will take you to articles from the journal you have chosen, related to the topic you have selected.

Printing documents

The BMJ Journal does not have an inbuilt print function. To print an article or abstract, use your web browser's print facility for HTML files, or Adobe Acrobat's print facility for PDF files, once the document is displayed on screen.

Saving Documents

The BMJ Journals does not have an inbuilt save function. If you wish to save the full text of an article, download the PDF version and use the save function in Adobe Acrobat.
